EMBEDDED RESOURCES



The United States has a total of six different time zones. Georgia is situated in the Eastern Time Zone. As you go west, you turn your clock back one hour as you enter each new time zone. As you travel east, you advance your clock ahead one hour for each zone.

To idea how time works, 1, when it is 12 noon in , England, it will be 7:00 a.m. , Georgia, and 4:00 a.m. in Los es, California. Heading east from Greenwich, however, you turn the clock ahead one hour every 15 degrees, until you reach the International Date Line. At that point—180°—the clock will have just hit midnight, the dawn of a new day— December 2.

USING LATITUDE AND LONGITUDE

Latitude and longitude are important because they provide a system for determining exact locations. They are important for other reasons, too. Look at the map of the United States and observe the lines of latitude and longitude and many of the state boundaries. A number of states—including Georgia—use latitude or longitude for one or more of their boundaries. Except for New Jersey and Hawaii, every state has one or more of its boundaries based on latitude, longitude, or both. Notice how this is especially true of the western states, which were settled last.

Street, had 25 chairs and served, because of segregation, an all-white clientele. Herndon gave generously to worthy causes and made many contributions that improved life in Atlanta's black community.

Two other Atlanta "institutions" came into existence during this period. Rich's, later thought of as "Atlanta's department store," was established in 1867 through the hard work and persevenance of Morris Rich, an immigrant from Hungary. Rich, after working as a store clark and peddler in Ohio and Tennessee, chose Atlanta as the place to open a small <u>dry goods</u>" store. After several moves to accommodate an expanding inventory. Morris was joined by his two brothers. Known as "M. Rich & Bros." The store continued to grow and flourish. Rich's success reflected Atlanta's progress.

MAKE A NOTE OF IT

TAKE THE SHORTCUT

Quick links are embedded throughout the pages of the digital textbook. Look for underlined subject headings on the *Timeline, Chapter Foreword,* and *At a Glance* pages that will advance you immediately to those sections.

The teacher tabs also contain bold, underlined page number links.

A return arrow in the upper left-hand corner of your destination page will take you back to your starting point.

Atlanta Race Riot

In the heat of the 1906 gubernatorial election, tensions in Atlanta began to boil over. The rising prominence of African Americans in the city, both in terms of their success in the business community and their influence as newly registered voters, had become a central issue during the Democratic primary. Newspapers inflamed the situation by headlining alleged atrocities committed by black men on white women, calling for Ku Klux Klan gatherings, and promoting talk of local lynchings. As a result, thousands of white men and boys gathered in mobs downtown on September 22, 1906. They attacked streetcars and blackowned businesses, smashed windows,
